An **article** is used before a noun to show whether it refers to something specific or not.

1 Definite Article "the"

used for specific objects or objects that both the speaker and the listener know

2 Indefinite Articles "a" and "an"

used for objects that are not specific or things of a similar type

Examples:

Let's read the book.

→ I mean a specific book that we both know.

I want to have the apple from the refrigerator.

 \rightarrow I mean I want to have the only apple or the specific apple from the refrigerator.

Let's read a book.

 \rightarrow I mean any book.

I want to have an apple from the refrigerator.

 \rightarrow I mean any apple among the apples from the refrigerator.

The Zero Article

It is sometimes possible to have a noun phrase with NO article - the so-called "ZERO article".

General Meaning

I don't like **children**. (= children in general)

Meals

What time do you have **breakfast**?

Specific Years, Months, Days

2020 was a terrible year.

Games, Sports

Basketball is one of the most popular sports in the world.

Languages, School Subjects

He doesn't speak English.

Hidden Meanings

I go to **school** every morning. She's in **hospital** now.

Think: What's the difference between "she is in hospital" and "she is in the hospital"?
