Adjective Clause / Relative Clause

a dependent clause that gives extra information about the noun, which always begins with a relative pronoun

I thought they were boring people whose interest was just to work.

relative pronoun ↓

relative clause

She just needs to find people whom she can trust.

It was Lina. She had it all planned out.

It was Lina who had it all planned out.

Grammar

Relative Pronouns	Stands for	Substitutes for
who	people	subject pronouns
whom	people	object pronouns
whose	people / things	possessive nouns / pronouns
that	people / things	subject / object pronouns
which	things	subject / object pronouns

She is the person. I admire her the most.

She is the person whom I admire the most.

	before the <u>verb</u> cannot be omitted	before <u>subject + verb</u> can be omitted	after <u>possessor / owner</u> cannot be omitted

	That's the woman who / that <u>sells</u> magazines.	We need to find a person who / whom / that <u>we can rely</u> on handling the business.	This is the painting of the <u>student</u> whose character is so ideal.
THINGS ANIMALS	which / that	which / that	which
	This is the cat that / which <u>bit</u> me the other day.	I'll buy the flip-flops which / that <u>I saw</u> online.	The <u>book</u> , which is entitled <i>The Old Man and The Sea</i> , won the Nobel Prize in 1954.
