Countable Nouns

Uncountable Nouns

countable

- can be counted
- · can be used with 'a' or 'an'
- · can be in the plural form

Examples:

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book = books plant = plants
car = cars pen = pens
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uncountable

- cannot be counted
- · don't go with 'a' or 'an'
- cannot be in the plural form

Examples:

music tea coffee sugar milk blood

- We use "much" in question/negative sentences with ______






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STEP 2

Write the objects found in each room.






"A mind map can help us organize all the topic vocabulary together!"
