






There are three types of conditional sentences. Let's now learn the second conditional.



We use this for imaginary situations, which we believe are nearly or completely impossible.



(But I don't know the answer so it's impossible for me to tell you.)

result

condition

I would travel around the world if I had a million dollars.

(I don't have a million dollars so I most likely can't travel around the world.)

Second Conditional

- If + past ... would + infinitive
- If I had time, I would go to more concerts. (But I haven't got time, so I can't go to more concerts.)
- The condition can be placed after the result.

would + infinitive ... if + past

I wouldn't be late for work if I had a car. (But I don't have a car so I'm often late for work.)

- 1. The verbs in the sentence are in the past tense although its meaning is present or future.
- **We often use were instead of was after If I/he/she/it:**

If he weren't (wasn't) a dancer, he would be an astronaut.

l wish

We use I wish + past for a wish about a present situation.

I wish I had more free time. (but I don't)

I wish I wasn't so busy. (but I am)

I wish I could travel to Mars. (but I can't)

! We use a past tense, although we are talking about now.

We often use were instead of was after I/he/she/it.

I wish I were (was) clever. (but I'm not) I wish I were (was) born wealthy. (but I'm not) He wishes he were (was) more confident. (but he isn't) She wishes she were (was) in a warmer climate. (but she isn't) Have a try! Guess the dialogue using the hints.






Second Conditional

We use this for imaginary situations, which we believe are nearly or completely impossible.

if + past ... would + infinitive
 If I had time, I would go to more concerts.

would + infinitive ... if + past
I wouldn't be late for work if I had a car.
